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## 1. President’s Welcome and Introduction of the Executive Committee

The minutes of the Delegates' Meeting held in Cape Town, 15 August 2007, were unanimously approved.

### 6. President's Report

Dear Colleagues

The report of the President is customarily given, according to our Constitutional rules, on the occasion of the Delegates' Meeting. My report will summarize the activities of the IAAP over the last three years, taking into account the work of the Executive Committee and its Sub-Committees and Working Parties. It is of necessity a long report, because it is important for you, our membership, to gain a sense of the breadth and depth of the IAAP's activities during this Administration. Those of you who are interested can consult the IAAP Website for more details.

Although this is usually a purely factual report, I would like to make some introductory observations about the functioning of the IAAP during this administration.

The IAAP as an organization has grown and developed significantly in recent years, as it has become increasingly more complex and globalized. There has been a parallel growth in the structure of its working groups – the 3 Standing Committees (the Ethics Committee, the Program Committee, and the Organizing Committee), 8 Sub-Committees, 6 Working Parties, and the Advisory Board for Congress Applications, as well as the Council of Societies. Each working group submits regular reports to the yearly meetings of the Executive Committee, where they are discussed in detail. This results in greater transparency and accountability.

Yearly reports are made available online on the IAAP website, and are contained in the three-yearly hardcopy publication of the Newsletter, which appears once in each administration.

A second major feature of this administration has been the ethos of consultation and consensus, which has imbued it with a particularly strong and welcome sense of a really viable work group ethic. There has been an atmosphere of open communication and collaboration that I personally have greatly valued. This does not mean that from time to time there have not been some disappointments and frustrations, when it has not been possible to complete some projects, as further complexities have emerged through the ongoing work. The hopes that we might establish a Mediation Service, or a Register of Jungian Child and Adolescent Analysts or Trainings, during this administration, are such examples: despite the considerable work that has already been accomplished on these matters, further work will be necessary. On the other hand, important progress has been made in taking forward the thinking about several projects – for example, proposals for a needed review of the IAAP's Constitution, a reformulation about how the finances are set out, and plans for a future reorganization of the IAAP's education and training functions. These projects, begun in this administration, will carry on into the next, and perhaps beyond.

I do feel able to report to you with confidence that there has been a sustained sense in this administration that its work has been carried out in a measured and thoughtful way, with considerable energy and focus, and, if I may say so, with remarkable camaraderie and mutual trust. I am particularly grateful to each and every member of the Executive Committee, including the Officers, for their contributions to the quality of this feeling during the past three years.

Here I wish to thank: the Officers (Joe Cambray, President Elect; Tom Kelly and Joerg Rashe, Vice Presidents; and Paul Kugler, Honorary Secretary). The Officers meet three times a year but email each other very regularly, often daily. The Members of the Executive Committee, representing the nine Societies that were voted to be on the Executive Committee at the last Delegates' Meeting in Cape Town in August 2007, are: Walter Boechat (AJB, Brazil), Angela Connolly (CIPA, Italy), JoAnn Culbert-Koehn (CGJILA, USA), Toshio Kawai (AJAJ, Japan), Tamar Kron (IJP, Israel), Marianne Muller (SGAP, Switzerland), Marjorie Nathanson (CGJISF, USA), Denise Ramos (SBrPA, Brazil), Jan Wiener (SAP, UK). The Executive Committee along with the Officers meets once a year. The administrative work has been carried out conscientiously and with a lovely spirit by the Presidential Secretary, Mariuccia Tresoldi, from Milan, along with Yvonne Trueb, the IAAP Zurich Secretary, (in absentia). The ever thoughtful services of the IAAP's Treasurer and lawyer, Martin Amsler, and our accountant, Daniel Gubser (in absentia), have been invaluable in ensuring that the IAAP conducts its business effectively and efficiently in a way that is consistent with the requirements of Swiss law, where the IAAP is legally registered.

I wish to pay special tribute here to two people who, although not members of the Executive Committee, have often attended portions of EC meetings that bear on their IAAP roles. They are Don Williams, our Webmaster, who devotes long hours ensuring the smooth functioning of our IAAP website. The other crucial person is Richard Willetts, who has served as Chair of the Ethics Committee during this Administration, also now as Parliamentarian at the Delegates' Meeting, and to whom the IAAP owes particular thanks. Richard has ensured with characteristic thoughtfulness and probity that the ethics provisions of the IAAP have been consistently available as a support and resource to the Executive Committee and its working groups. Richard is stepping down as Chair and the new Chair of Ethics will be announced in due course. The IAAP owes him a deep debt of gratitude.

And so to my report.

Continuing with the theme of our membership, the number of analysts officially registered on the IAAP Members' List over the last three administrations has increased from some 2500 in 2001 to almost 3000 members now. These figures may further increase as we take decisions during the course of this meeting. This represents a respectable increase of about 17%, compared to a decade ago where it was reported that we had an increase of about 10%. Of course, regrettably we have lost a number of our Members as the population grows older, with deaths and retirements. But the percentage increase remains, despite these losses. In 2001, after the Cambridge Congress, we had 48 Member Groups. We now have 51 Member Groups and 52 Individual Members. By the end of this meeting, these numbers may well have increased.

## **Overview of Committees, Sub-Committees, and Working Parties**

### **1. Standing Committees**

#### **a. The Ethics Committee**

This crucial Committee, which is now in its eighth year, consists of Richard Willetts, CGJISF, Chair; Ann Casement, BAP, Honorary Secretary; Henry Abramovitch, IIJP; Mariana Arancibia, IM; Christian Gaillard, SFPA; Dong-Hyuck Suh, KAJA; Ellen Kandoian Sweeney, OVAJA; Carole Beebe Tarantelli, CIPA; and Ursula Wirtz, SGAP.

The Committee has carried out its mandated role to educate and consult as well as to provide ethical oversight for Individual Members and Routers. It provided an extensive bibliography on ethics to aid in the training of the Routers. It reviewed a number of proposed Ethics Codes for new Societies as well as provided consultation to existing Societies in the revision of their codes. Several individual Societies consulted with the Ethics Committee on matters specific to their group. The Chair also consulted extensively to the Executive Committee and to a number of Sub-Committees and Working Parties of the IAAP.

The Committee received and responded to questions and concerns from individuals about the analytic treatment they had received. These were addressed, and when appropriate the matter was referred to a local Society.

In addressing its role to update and revise the document, Minimal Standards and Procedures, the Committee has proposed four changes which have been approved by the Executive Committee and will be presented to the Delegates during this Meeting for approval.

#### **b. The Program Committee**

The Program Committee is composed of 10 members: Axel Capriles (SVAJ, AGAP), Grazia Cerbo (AIPA), Kusum Dhar Prabhu (AGAP), François Martin Vallas (SFPA), Judith Pickering



(ANZSJA), and, traditionally, the Officers, Hester Solomon (President), Joe Cambray (President-Elect), Joerg Rasche (Vice-President), Paul Kugler (Honorary Secretary), and Tom Kelly (Vice-President) who is Chair of the Committee. The Program Committee met in Zurich in February 2008 to select a theme for the Congress and again in February 2009 to make a selection for the program for this Congress from over 300 proposals. Great thanks indeed are due to Tom Kelly for the extraordinary efforts he has put into making the Congress Program run so smoothly and such a creative event for us all.

### **c. The Organizing Committee**

The Organizing Committee is composed of the local analysts in Montreal: Denis Charrier Adams, Daniel Bordeleau, Françoise Cloutier, Guy Corneau, Marcel Gaumond, Rosemary Murray Lachapelle, Tom Kelly, Yvon Rivière, and Jan Bauer as Chair of the Committee. The Organizing Committee has worked tirelessly to give you a flavour of Montreal as a multicultural city and center for the arts and to make the Congress a memorable experience.

## **2. Sub Committees**

### **a. Developing Groups Sub-Committee**

There are currently 21 official IAAP Developing Groups -- groups of professionals in areas of the world where no IAAP Member Group exists. It is remarkable to take note that such groups, some numbering well over 20 or more, have been meeting on a regular basis over time. They have themselves approached the IAAP seeking assistance with their Jungian Study Program, and we have thought it crucial to the IAAP's future and to such groups that the IAAP be responsive to such requests. Each new group has undergone a detailed application process and an on-site visit by two senior IAAP members. There have been four new Developing Groups accepted in the past three years: the Romanian Association for Analytical Psychology; the Malta Depth Psychological Society; the Shanghai IAAP Developing Group; and the Taipei Developing Group. We have sought to develop a 'twinning program' to encourage IAAP Member Groups to work closely with a particular Developing Group -- such partnerships are already in place in Russia, Poland, Georgia and Tunisia.

There is much work involved in the Developing Groups program. For the first time since its inception not long ago, the Developing Groups Sub-Committee is co-chaired -- by Joe Cambray, President Elect, and Jan Wiener (SAP – EC member), and, traditionally, includes the other Officers. The two Co-Chairs have distributed their work by each taking responsibility for different regions of the world and managing the day-to-day business within each region. This included management of the budget for each Group, in coordination with the Liaison Person, the Developing Group President and the IAAP Accountant. This has provided fiscal stability and significantly reduced costs.

### **b. Individual Membership Sub-Committee**

This Sub-Committee is chaired by Tom Kelly, with Joe Cambray and Angela Connolly as members. The purpose of the Router Program is to offer professionals in countries, with few resources and without an approved IAAP training program, the possibility of becoming IAAP Individual Members with the help and support of the IAAP according to our Constitutional provisions. During this administration, 33 routers from 10 countries have completed the requirements to apply to become Individual Members of the IAAP and are eligible to be voted into membership at this Meeting. We will come to this item later today.

There are currently 202 ongoing routers in 25 countries. To honor the original spirit and purpose of the Router Program, the EC has been asked to agree to no longer accept new

applications for the Router Program from West European countries, a policy which the EC agreed in 2010.

The Router program requires that potential Routers make a detailed application and pass a screening interview, the equivalent of an admissions interview. Once accepted, the Router must complete at least the minimal requirements to become an Individual Member, as defined in the IAAP Constitution, then be presented to the Executive Committee for their recommendation, which is then presented to the Delegates' Meeting for approval.

### **c. Finance Sub-Committee**

An important innovation during this Administration was to establish the position of Finance Officer, which Joe Cambray kindly agreed to serve. Joe and I worked with the IAAP Treasurer, Martin Amsler, and our accountant, Daniel Gubser, throughout this administration. In the early stages, we looked closely at each aspect of the finances and worked to set them out in a more user friendly, comprehensible way.

I would like to say that during this important exercise I often felt like a trainee accountant in the ways of Swiss accountancy!

I am pleased to report that the IAAP's finances are in a healthy state, which is particularly satisfying given the current global financial situation. For this reason, and respecting the fact that Member Groups and Individual Members are now facing varying degrees of economic stress, the Executive Committee, on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, is not requesting a raise in fees from the Delegates' Meeting this year.

A fuller report on the finances from Joe Cambray will follow shortly on the Agenda.

### **d. Fund Raising Sub-Committee**

The Fund Raising Sub-Committee, guided by its Chair, Tom Kelly, worked to raise funds to support the relief effort following the devastating earthquake in the Sichuan Province of China. IAAP routers and members of the DG in Guangzhou, under the guidance of Professor Heyong Shen, currently the only IAAP Individual Member in the People's Republic of China, have worked tirelessly to help the victims, especially children, of the earthquake. Their work continues to this day. He has also worked on a similar project with IAAP routers and Developing Group members in the recent disaster region near to Tibet, in southwest China (Qinghai Province), and has been awarded one of China's highest honours at the National Congress of Clinical Psychologists in October 2009 for his work. In addition, the graduate program he directs also received a distinguished award. Many of the Developing Group members in Guangzhou are members of the graduate program that received the award.

Funds were also raised to support the work in several Developing Groups, including Georgia, Ukraine and Tunisia. In some cases, the funds raised were a direct result of the dedication and concerted efforts of the Liaison Persons for the Developing Groups, such as John Hill, and Christian Gaillard. The French Society also made a very generous donation to the group in Tunisia.

Since the autumn, funds have been raised to provide financial assistance to Routers, Provisional Members, Individual Members and Members of Developing Groups who wished to attend the Congress in Montreal. A letter of appeal was sent to the President of each IAAP Society and to previous donors. While the effects of the economic crisis are clearly being felt, the Sub-Committee has been fortunate to receive a generous donation from the Oswald Family Foundation, as well as from the Gert and Rodtraud Sauer Foundation. In total, 40 Congress participants have been given financial assistance to attend this Congress.

The Russian Revival Fund, organized by members of all four Societies in London under the auspices of the SAP, have worked tirelessly to raise additional funds to supplement and support the DG and Router Programs in Moscow and St Petersburg.

#### **e. Publications and Communication Sub-Committee**

Under the energetic chairmanship of Angela Connolly, along with Tamar Kron and Don Williams, the Publications and Communication Sub-Committee has been very productive during this administration. With the invaluable help of our Webmaster, Don Williams, and in consultation with François Martin-Vallas, the website has been redesigned and it is now more attractive and user-friendly.

The Sub-Committee has brought out two on-line Newsletters and, with the able assistance of the Editor, Emilija Kiehl, the handsome hard copy of the Newsletter and the new Membership List have now been sent to all Members.

Last year the Sub-Committee published the Proceedings of the Cape Town Congress and thanks are due to the Editor, Pramila Bennett, and the Publisher, Bob Hinshaw, for the success of this venture.

A forum site on the IAAP website has been created for exchange of information amongst the Presidents. Recently, a site was created for discussion of the IAAP's finances, overseen by Joe Cambray, the Finance Officer, and Martin Amsler, our Treasurer and Attorney. At first open to the Presidents, it was then opened to all IAAP members to use as an information site prior to the discussion of the IAAP's finances here at the Delegates' Meeting.

#### **f. Academic Sub-Committee**

This Sub-Committee is co-chaired by Jörg Rasche and Toshio Kawai, with Denise Ramos and Tamar Kron as members. The Sub-Committee is concerned with Conferences, Research Projects and Scientific Publications and uses its budget to support worthy projects in Jungian fields.

In 2009 the Sub-Committee spent 30.000 CHF for a variety of academic projects: the Philemon Foundation project to publish Jung's ETH Lectures, events related to the Red Book, a Dream Research project in Israel, and international conferences in Europe, China and South America. I will give more details of these later in this report.

The Sub-Committee through the work of Denise Ramos has also organized an important update of the scientific database about ongoing studies with Jungian topics on the IAAP website.

#### **g. Society Applications Sub-Committee**

Particular acknowledgement needs to go to the Society Applications Sub-Committee under its Chair, Marjorie Nathanson, with Walter Boechat, JoAnn Culbert-Koehn and Marianne Muller as members. The Sub-Committee received four applications from groups of Analysts wishing to become new IAAP Societies. The Sub-Committee reviewed the documents, and made recommendations to the EC concerning the outcome of the applications. The processing of such applications is extremely detailed and arduous. The recommendations regarding these applications will be addressed later on in our Agenda.

The Sub-Committee this past year worked on developing a procedure for Group Members to follow when they wish to change the names of their Societies.

It has also continued to revise the document "Guidelines for Applying for Society Membership in the IAAP," arising out of the Sub-Committee's experiences in processing applications.

## **h. Honorary Membership Sub-Committee**

At the EC Meeting in February 2009 the *New Criteria and Procedure for Election to Honorary Membership of the IAAP* was accepted by the Executive Committee. At the same time the EC decided to lift the moratorium on new applications.

Marianne Muller, Chair of the Sub-Committee, along with Angela Connolly and Marjorie Nathanson, members, has overseen the detailed revisions to the Sub-Committee's working documents.

There will be no nominations for Honorary Membership this year. The time before the Congress when proposals must be made, had already passed when the moratorium was lifted. Concerns have also been expressed about the viability of this membership category, to which the next Administration will give further consideration.

## **3. Working Parties**

### **a. Mediation Working Party**

The Mediation Working Party, under the Chairmanship of Marjorie Nathanson, with Walter Boechat, JoAnn Culbert-Koehn, Marianne Muller, Jan Wiener, Richard Willetts (ex officio), Astrid Berg, consultant, and myself (ex officio), addressed the possibility of developing an IAAP Mediation Service of which Group Members could make use when conflicts arise within a Society.

Persons experienced in mediation within the IAAP were sent a questionnaire, developed by the Working Party, enquiring about various possible ways of conducting mediation. From this data, a list of potential mediators was drawn up. In considering the various possibilities, the Working Party also developed a number of issues and considerations that would need to be addressed in the next Administration, prior to establishing a Mediation Service. For the time being, a Service will be offered as it has in the past, on an ad hoc basis, drawing on the list of potential Mediators.

### **b. Child and Adolescent Working Party**

The Working Party is co-chaired by Joerg Rasche and JoAnn Culbert-Koehn, with Brigitte Allain-Dupre, Caterina Vezzoli and Judith Woodhead. The rationale behind establishing this Working Party in Cape Town was to gain more knowledge about the current state of Child and Adolescent Training and Analysis in the IAAP, and, if possible, to begin to consider proposals or guidelines for institutes that wish to offer a child analysis training and infant observation course. Much information was gleaned but a final proposal was not thought possible as yet.

### **c. Training Models Working Party**

The aim of this Working Party, chaired by Joerg Rasche, with Joe Cambray, Toshio Kawai, Tom Kelly, and Jan Wiener, was to compile information about the current training programs of IAAP Member Societies and related Institutes. The main project during this administration has been to revise and update the questionnaire that Denise Ramos earlier developed. Many additional categories have been included in order to make the new questionnaire a solid basis for comparison amongst current training models.

### **d. Education Working Party**

The Education Working Party was formed at the February 2009 Executive Committee meeting to address a number of considerations regarding the overlap between the Individual Members Sub-Committee and the Developing Groups Sub-Committee, and to review overall the IAAP's training and education functions.

In June, 2008, a meeting took place in London between Hester Solomon, President, Joe Cambray and Jan Wiener, Co-chairs of the Developing Groups Sub-Committee, and Tom Kelly, Chair of the Individual Membership Sub-Committee, to discuss the current and future structural relations between these two Sub-Committees. The purpose of the London meeting was to review the history and evolution of the Developing Groups' and the Individual Members' Programs. A proposal emerged for a new Education Working Party, and this was presented to the Executive Committee in February 2009, when a special session was set aside to discuss in detail the recommendations from the London Report. During the session a proposal was made to more clearly delineate the educational function for the members of DGs, Routers and Individual Members. It was decided that for the time being the DG and IM Sub-Committees would continue to function as they have for the past several years, working separately, but in coordination. At the same time, a new Education Working Party, under the chairmanship of Angela Connolly, would be formed to begin to put together the necessary working documents to co-ordinate the two Programs. This work is ongoing and I am sure will continue in the next administration.

#### **e. IAAP Archives**

Paul Kugler kindly agreed to lead an Archives Working Party, along with Marianne Muller and myself, with the help of Yvonne Trueb. The IAAP Archives are housed in a small room in the basement of the old Jung Institute, at 27 Gemeindestrasse, Zürich. During the July 2008 Officers' meeting, a site visit to the IAAP archive took place. In preparation for the visit, the Officers first met with members of the ETH Archive and reviewed the Jung Archive exhibit.

During the course of the site visit, it became apparent that the archive documents had not been separated into sensitive and non-sensitive documents. In light of this, a moratorium on access to the IAAP Archive was put in place until the sensitive documents can be segregated and placed in a secure location and procedures for access can be established. In the meantime, access is allowed only with the permission of the IAAP President. A new lockup filing cabinet has now been purchased and installed in the Archives to secure sensitive documents.

#### **f. Governance Working Party**

The primary task of the Governance Working Party over the past two years has been to carefully consider the need for and feasibility of revising the IAAP Constitution. To lay the groundwork for such a project, in February 2008, a Constitution Review Working Party under the chairmanship of Paul Kugler was formed to review the current state of the IAAP Constitution and By-Laws and assess the feasibility of revising these documents in view of growing evidence that the current Constitution, although basically sound, had for a while needed revision in view of internal inconsistencies and the current demands of Swiss law.

Because of the importance of the constitutional review, this matter will come under a specific item on the agenda today, so I will not go into more details about the potential project now. The vigilant oversight of Paul Kugler, Marianne Muller, Joe Cambray, Martin Amsler, and to some extent myself, has made possible this project of review and option creation.

At this point I would like to say that, just like with the finances, I feel I have had to become a trainee lawyer to get to grips with the important issues involved in this complex, but necessary, subject.

## **g. Advisory Board**

The main purpose of the Advisory Board is to review applications to host the next IAAP Congress. We were fortunate to have Paul Kugler and Murray Stein act in this important capacity. Their findings will be reported later in this meeting.

## **4. Council of Societies**

My report would not be complete without specific mention of the meeting of the Council of Societies, which took place in February 2010, in Zurich, along with the Executive Committee and the Officers, with our lawyer and treasurer, Martin Amsler. A subsequent review meeting took place on Sunday, just prior to the commencement of this Congress.

Presidents or their representatives from a significant proportion of all the member groups of the IAAP came together in Zurich to be informed of what this administration has addressed and accomplished during these three years, and, most importantly, to review and discuss the various topics that will be covered during today's meeting. The object of the meeting of the Council of Societies, is that the Presidents or their representatives should be able to receive a good overview of the IAAP's work and the agenda items that will be addressed today, so that informed discussion can take place at the home societies, in order better to prepare for this meeting.

## **External relations**

Finally, I want to let you know about the relations the IAAP enters into and enjoys with external organizations, and about the conferences we have co-sponsored.

### **1. DSM-V: Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders**

With the help of John Beebe, the IAAP submitted a letter to the Work Group on Personality and Personality Disorders of the forthcoming revised version, DSM-V, regarding their proposal to pathologize 'introversion' by making it one of the 'trait domains' indicative of personality disorder.

The letters sent by the IAAP and other organizations such as CNASJA and by individual analysts have had an impact. Although a formal statement has as yet not been issued by the Work Group, there is word that another term than 'introversion' to refer to the phenomenon of psychic withdrawal, was being considered and that was "detachment". This result would avoid pathologizing the term 'introversion'. This is a very good result for us, and, I may say, for the Work Group that took heed of our representations.

### **2. Relations with allied organizations**

By 'allied organization', we mean a jointly agreed formal arrangement to be considered an allied organization with another professional body. The IAAP has formal relations with 3 allied organizations: the International Association of Jungian Studies, the Philemon Foundation, and the International Society for Sandplay Therapy.

#### **a. IAJS**

We jointly mounted a successful conference with the IAJS in Zurich in June 2009, the third conference to be thus organized – the two previous in Essex, and in Texas. More will be noted later in this report.

A joint letter from the IAAP and IAJS Presidents was sent to the President of Clark University expressing concern regarding the lack of representation of Jung at the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Clarke University lectures given by Freud and Jung. No response was received.

## **b. The Philemon Foundation**

The IAAP continues to support the work of the Philemon Foundation in bringing the unpublished manuscripts and letters of C G Jung to the public domain. We are all very aware of the ground breaking event of *The Red Book's* publication this year, and many events around this publication have already taken place. There was a very popular exhibition at the New York's Rubin Museum in October 2009, [followed by an exhibit at the Hammer Museum in Los Angeles in April 2010](#) and at the Library of Congress, in Washington, in June 2010. Both events were co-sponsored by the IAAP. Other IAAP Societies have equally put on events without direct IAAP support, such as in London and San Francisco. Of course, at this Congress we have enjoyed the presentation of Sonu Shamdasani on Monday evening, and a panel plenary presentation on Tuesday.

## **c. The International Society for Sandplay Therapy**

No events were held jointly between the IAAP and the ISST during this administration. Both organizations continue to enjoy collegial relations, and a number of ISST members are attending this Congress.

## **3. Relations with the International Psychoanalytic Association**

Although there is no formal reciprocal relationship with the IPA, we continued to enjoy the theoretical and clinical benefits of mutual attendance at our Conferences. At the IPA's biannual Congress in Chicago in 2008, under the panel title 'Freudian and Jungian approaches: convergences and divergences', our psychoanalytic friend, Alain Gibeault, and former President Christian Gaillard, co-chaired an exchange of papers between myself and our psychoanalytic colleague, Dr Sylvia Fletcher, while Andrew Samuels responded to her paper and Dr Steve Ellman to mine.

Alain Gibeault was due to attend this congress to give a joint Panel with Christian Gaillard, but regretfully could not do so. The panel took place yesterday with Peruvian psychoanalyst Dr. Eduardo Gastelumendi.

## **4. IAAP Co-Sponsored Conferences**

Support for academic Jungian conferences is given through 'Seed Money' for the initial organization, which is usually paid back after a conference, and also grants which do not need to be repaid.

### **a. IAAP – IAJS Conference**

The joint IAAP – IAJS Conference in Zurich in June 2009, was such a venture. John Beebe, Angela Connolly, and Murray Stein represented the IAAP in helping to organize this conference. There are currently no active plans for future conferences, but IAJS has recently met and there may be initiatives for further joint ventures in the future.

### **b. 4<sup>th</sup> China Conference**

The 4<sup>th</sup> China Conference (April 2009) was a significant success. The IAAP Officers and other IAAP members active in China, gave papers alongside illustrious Chinese professors of psychology, sociology and of the I Ching.

### **c. Vilnius Conference**

In July 2009 the First European Conference on Analytical Psychology was held in Vilnius, Lithuania. The conference was a truly moving event where there occurred an exchange of experiences embedded in the history of the area, and a real meeting of East and West. The

Presidents of the European Societies had their first official meeting at the conference and a second meeting was held here in Montreal during the IAAP Congress.

#### **d. South American Congress**

The fifth Latin American Congress was held in September 2009, in Santiago, Chile. The Congress was very well attended, including several IAAP Officers, reflecting the growing and vibrant interest in South America for Analytical Psychology.

#### **e. Conferences organized by CIPA**

Our Italian colleagues in CIPA, especially Caterina Vezzoli, Nadia Fina, and Francesco Bisagni, have been prolific in organizing conferences co-sponsored by the IAAP. In 2007, Ethics and Training; 2009, Ethics in Supervision; 2010, Ethics and Supervision with difficult cases -- all held in Sardinia. In Milan, further co-sponsored conference included in 2008, 2009, and 2010, the IFSCA conferences on Childhood and Adolescence. The IAAP has agreed to sponsor the next – and what will be the last in this series – in 2011.

#### **f. Conference: Freud Meets Jung – A Centenary Celebration: Sexuality, Hysteria or Complex?**

The Freud Meets Jung Conference was a one-day event held in London on 24<sup>th</sup> November 2007 to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first meeting between Sigmund Freud and Carl Jung. It was jointly organized by The British Psycho-Analytical Society, The Society of Analytical Psychology, and The Journal of Analytical Psychology. The Conference was co-sponsored by the International Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP) and the International Psychoanalytical Association (IPA).

This ends my summary report of the work of the IAAP during this administration.

I think you will appreciate that an enormous amount of energy and dedication on the part of many IAAP members has gone into these activities. There is plenty of scope for more IAAP members to be involved, and I invite you to participate in these valuable and, I would truly say, life enhancing – certainly professionally enhancing - activities.

### **7. Treasurer's Report**

#### **A. Treasurer's Report for the years 2007, 2008, and 2009**

Mr. Amsler presented the official report to the Delegates Meeting stating that, in his capacity as Treasurer for the IAAP, he had audited the Annual Accounts of the years 2007, 2008 2009 along the guidelines of legal regulations. He found that the Balance Sheet and Profit and Loss Statement are in conformity with bookkeeping. In addition, the provisions of the Constitution as well as legal valuation principles have been followed in the statement of the Financial Assets. Mr. Amsler recommended approval of the 2007, 2008, and 2009 financial reports.

The President thanked Mr. Amsler for his report.



## B. Internal Audit Report (Angela Connolly)

In the course of this administration three internal audits were carried out by Marianne Muller and Angela Connolly. Under Mr Amsler's advice it has been the policy of the IAAP to avoid high risk investments and the wisdom of this policy was confirmed by the fact that despite the global financial recession the state of the IAAP finances is very healthy. In 2010 the total value of the IAAP stands at 799,996 CHF which represents an increase of capital of 42,148 CHF with respect to 2008.

On the recommendations of the auditors structural changes in the presentation of the budget have been put in place and the accounting system is now much clearer and transparent.

In the budget figures of 2008 and 2009 the actual expenses of the various organs of the IAAP were, in most cases, less than the figures anticipated, a clear indication of the day to day control over expenses on the part of the Finance Officer and the Chairs of the Sub-Committees and the Working Parties. The system of accruals now in place allows for flexibility and is a safeguard against any major financial disasters such as the cancellation of a Congress.

The auditors indicated the accounting has always been accurate and correct.

The President thanked Angela Connolly for her Report.

Having received the reports from the Treasurer and the internal auditors, the President asked the Delegates to accept the Treasurer's Report for the years 2007, 2008, 2009, the internal audit report and the Balance Sheets of 2007, 2008, and 2009. The Delegates unanimously accepted the Treasurer's and Auditors' Reports.

The reports were unanimously approved.

## C. Election of the Treasurer

The President recommended the Treasurer's reelection. The Delegates' vote carried with one abstention to reelect Martin Amsler to the position of IAAP Treasurer for the next three years.

### 8. Release of the Executive Committee from liability

As is customary, the President asked the Delegates to vote to release the EC from liability for financial matters. The Delegates voted unanimously to release the Executive Committee from liability for financial matters during the previous three-year term of office.

### 9. Financial Report and Membership Dues

In preparation for discussion of the IAAP finances at this meeting, the Finance Officer (JC) together with the IAAP Accountant (DG) and the IAAP Treasurer (MA) created two documents (a short and a long version of the IAAP Financial Statements, including the Profit and Loss Statements and the Balance Sheets for the three years of this administration) which were placed on the IAAP website in March 2010, following the Council of Societies' meeting and a forum for discussion was opened.

At first this was available to the IAAP Group Member Presidents and Individual Members. Later the forum was opened up to the full IAAP membership and kept open until shortly before the Congress. These same documents were projected on screens at the Delegates' Meeting, and a brief review of the financial figures was given by the Finance Officer.

In conjunction with the Treasurer's report and that of the internal audit, the decision was made by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Officer and President that no increase in dues was needed for the next administration.

The President thanked Joe Cambray for his sterling work on the IAAP finances.

#### 10. Election of Officers as per Art. 8 Constitution

Joe Cambray was ratified by acclamation as the next President of the IAAP. The newly elected President announced that Angela Connolly would serve as Honorary Secretary for the next administration. Angela Connolly was presented to the Delegates.

The President thank Paul Kugler, the outgoing Honorary Secretary, for all he had done for this administration and for his constant support for the President and the Executive Committee.

The two candidates for President-Elect, Tom Kelly and Jörg Rasche, each gave a short position statement. The Delegates voted by secret ballot and Tom Kelly was elected President-elect. There were two candidates for Vice-President, Marianne Müller and Jan Wiener. Each read a short position statement. As there were only two nominees for the two positions of Vice-President, and there were two positions open, Marianne Müller and Jan Wiener were elected by acclamation.

#### 11. Applications of Individual Members

The Executive Committee proposed to the Delegates to accept the following 33 applicants from 11 different countries as Individual Members of the IAAP:

The President reported that these applicants have fulfilled the requirements for Individual Membership in the IAAP and are recommended for membership by the Executive Committee. The Delegates voted unanimously to approve en bloc the 33 candidates for Individual Membership. The President will present the IAAP Certificates to the new Individual Members during the Closing Ceremony of the Montreal Congress.

## 12. Election of Executive Committee Members

A list of Group Members eligible to stand for election was presented to the Delegates and those who did not wish to be considered for election were removed from the list. The Delegates voted by secret ballot and elected the following Group Members to the Executive Committee for the next administration:

There was a tie vote for the 9<sup>th</sup> member of the Executive Committee. The Constitution stipulates that the IAAP President will cast the deciding vote in the event of a tie. The President did not wish to decide the determining vote herself, as both Member groups (AJB and ANZSJA) were excellent candidates and either one would serve the IAAP well. Instead, the President decided to have the outcome of the election be determined by a flip of a coin. Prior to the start of the Thursday morning Plenary Session and in the presence of the IAAP lawyer, Martin Amsler, the Parliamentarian and Chair of the Ethics Committee, Richard Willetts, and the Ethics Committee member overseeing the voting process, Ursula Wirtz, Hester Solomon flipped a coin. The outcome was that AJB, Associação Junguiana do Brazil, was elected to the 9<sup>th</sup> position on the Executive Committee.

### 13. Applications of Group Members

The Report on new society applications received during this administration was presented. The Delegates were informed that the Society Applications Sub-Committee received applications from four groups wishing to become new Societies. Two were applying to become non-training Societies, and two to become training Societies. The two non-training Societies were SOMEJ (Sociedad Mexicana CJ Jung) and LAAP (Lithuanian Association of Analytical Psychology). The two Societies applying to become Group Members with training status were ICGJB (Institut C. G. Jung Barcelona) and LIRPA (Laboratorio Italiano di Ricerche in Psicologia Analitica).

Following reports from the Society Applications Sub-Committee, the IAAP Executive Committee carefully considered the applications from SOMEJ (Sociedad Mexicana CJ Jung) and LAAP (Lithuanian Association of Analytical psychology) and recommended they be approved to become Member Groups with non-training status.

The IAAP Executive Committee also carefully considered the applications from ICGJB (Institut C. G. Jung Barcelona) and LIRPA (Laboratorio Italiano di Ricerche in Psicologia Analitica) for Group Membership with training status to the IAAP.

The ICGJB and LIRPA applications both required Committees of Inquiry due to negative letters of non-objection from some neighbouring Societies. The Executive Committee carefully considered the recommendations of the Committees of Inquiry and the Applications Sub-committee and in each instance recommended to the Delegates to approve the applications for Group Membership but without training status.

The Delegates approved the following recommendations of the Executive Committee:

SOMEJ (Sociedad Mexicana CJ Jung), non-training status;  
LAAP (Lithuanian Association of Analytical Psychology), non-training status;  
ICGJB (Institut C. G. Jung Barcelona), non-training status;  
LIRPA (Laboratorio Italiano di Ricerche in Psicologia Analitica), non-training status.

### 14. Amendments to Ethics Documents

The following proposed amendments to the working documents of the Ethics Committee were presented to the Delegates:

#### Proposal # 1

To amend Section 1a) of the *Guidelines for Minimal Standards in the Code of Ethics for the Member Groups of the IAAP* by adding the phrase in bold:

Patients must be protected from exploitation by the analyst. Examples of such exploitation include sexual relations with a patient, **terminating a therapeutic relationship in order to have a sexual relationship**, and financial dealings outside of the usual fee arrangements.

#### Proposal # 2

To amend Section III k) of the *Guidelines for Minimal Standards in the Code of Ethics for the Member Groups of the IAAP* by adding the sentence in bold:

**Provision should be made so that the resignation of a member does not in itself prevent the final resolution of an ethics complaint.**

### Proposal # 3

To amend Section C 1) of the *Responsibilities and Procedures of the Ethics Committee of the IAAP* by adding the sentence in bold:

All complaints shall be made directly to the Chairperson of the Ethics Committee (the Committee). Complaints which have been addressed to other Officers or to the Secretariat of the IAAP, shall be forwarded to the Chairperson. The procedure, which the Committee follows, should be designed to give both the complainant and defendant an opportunity to substantiate their position. **When appropriate and with the continuing concurrence of the parties, the Chair, in consultation with the other members of the Committee, may offer or designate another member of the Committee to offer to facilitate communication between the parties aimed at informally resolving the matter.**

### Proposal # 4

To amend Section B1 (a) of the *Responsibilities and Procedures of the Ethics Committee of the IAAP* by adding the word "only" in bold:

The functions of the Ethics Committee shall include the following:

a) to conduct the investigation and adjudication of complaints about breaches of the IAAP's Code of Ethics **only** in relation to Individual Members (Individual Members include those persons who have officially registered as pursuing/seeking Individual Membership), and where applicable to recommend appropriate action to the IAAP Executive Committee.

The Delegates unanimously approved Proposal #1.

The Delegates unanimously approved Proposal #2.

The Delegates approved Proposal #3 with 4 abstentions.

The Delegates approved Proposal #4 with 1 vote opposed and 1 abstention.

### 15. Constitutional Review

The results of the Constitution Review Working Party's Feasibility Study on revising the IAAP Constitution and By-laws were presented. The Working Party concluded after two and a half years of research that revising the IAAP Constitution and By-laws was not only possible, but necessary. The Working Party differentiated 4 types of possible revisions to the Constitution:

- (1) No change;
- (2) Make Constitution and By-Laws internally consistent and congruent with each other;
- (3) Modernize the Constitution by resolving the internal inconsistencies between the Constitution and By-laws, & incorporating the essential material from the By-Laws into the Constitution, placing procedural details in the EC and Sub-Committee working documents;
- (4) A major rewrite of the Constitution, including substantive constitutional changes.

The Executive Committee at its February 2010 meeting unanimously recommended adopting the Constitution Review Working Party's option #3. The findings were subsequently presented to the Council of Societies' Meeting in February 2010 and a non-binding straw vote of the

Representatives was taken. The straw vote was unanimous in affirming support for the adoption of option #3 to revise the IAAP Constitution.

During discussion of this item, Tom Kirsch proposed that a lawyer specializing in Swiss constitutional law review the final revisions to the Constitution prior to bringing it to the next Delegates' Meeting. Hester Solomon responded that although there could not be a formal vote on Dr. Kirsch's proposal, the recommendation would be taken under advisement by the next Administration.

The Delegates were also presented with the recommendations from the Constitution Review Working Party regarding revising the Constitution and a vote of support was requested. The Delegates voted over-whelmingly to support adopting option #3.

#### 16. Next Congress:

Misser Berg presented the proposal of the Danish Society for Analytical Psychology and C.G. Jung Institute in Copenhagen to host the 19<sup>th</sup> IAAP International Congress in August 2013. Information on Copenhagen and the proposed site were reviewed by the Advisory Board. The Advisory Board recommended approval of the proposal by the Danish Society for Analytical Psychology and C.G. Jung Institute in Copenhagen to host the 19<sup>th</sup> IAAP International Congress in August 2013. The Delegates approved by acclamation Copenhagen as the site of the 2013 IAAP Congress. The Danish Society for Analytical Psychology and C. G. Jung Institute in Copenhagen were thanked by Hester Solomon for their gracious invitation.

Due to the late time, suggestions for the themes of the 2013 Congress were not collected. Instead, Delegates were requested to submit possible themes for the next Congress to the IAAP Secretariat. The suggestions will be given to the Chair of the 2013 Congress Program Committee.

#### 17. Any other Business

A. Ursula Ulmer made a request that there be better communication and more information on the Router Program available to the IAAP membership.

B. A written motion was submitted to the chair of the Delegates Meeting with 23 signatures. The "Motion for the Delegates Meeting" addressed various concerns regarding translation of the Congress presentations. The Guidelines and Procedures for Convening and Conducting the IAAP Delegates' Meeting only allows for two kinds of motions from the floor: (1) procedural motions and (2) amendments to resolutions appearing on the agenda. As this motion did not qualify for either type allowed, it could not be discussed. The written motion will be passed on to the newly elected President, Joe Cambray, with a copy sent to the new Chair of the Program Committee for the next IAAP Congress, Robert Wimmer.

#### 18. Adjourn

Hester Solomon thanked the Delegates, the Executive Committee members, Martin Amsler, Richard Willetts, Ursula Wirtz and the vote counters for their active participation in the meeting.

The President adjourned the meeting at 18:20.

A standing ovation followed closure of the meeting.
