Pilar Amezaga, SUAPA, Uruguay

clinical psychologist and Jungian Training Analyst. She became an Individual Member of the International Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP) in 1992. She is a co-founder of the Uruguayan Society for Analytical Psychology (SUPA) and the Uruguayan-Argentinian Society for Analytical Psychology (SUAPA). She has been a member of the IAAP Executive Committee since 2013 and serves as President of the IAAP (2025). She is also Regional Organizer for Latin America in the IAAP Router Program. She holds a Master's degree in Jungian Psychotherapy and has taught psychology and Jungian psychotherapy at graduate level. She served as teacher and Director of the Master's Program in Jungian Psychotherapy at the Catholic University of Uruguay and works as a clinical supervisor and master's thesis tutor. She has published on Jungian psychology, cultural complexes, psychotherapy, and symbolic-archetypal psychopathology.



Misser Berg, DSAP, Denmark

Misser Berg, Individual Member of IAAP in 1992. Co-founder of the Danish Society for Analytical Psychology, DSAP and President of DSAP from 2000 - 2005. Director of Training at the C.G. Jung Institute, Copenhagen from 2006-2019. Born and brought up in South Wales, UK, she previously worked as a social worker in SE London and Edinburgh dealing with cases of child abuse, racism, misogyny, social and economic cycles of deprivation. Elizabeth is interested in research themes that include shifting borders and identity from theoretical and clinical perspectives. She is a member of the CGJIZ English Research Commission and an editorial board member of *The International Journal of Jungian Studies (IJJS)*. Her latest co-edited books *Jungian and Interdisciplinary Analyses of Emotions* and *Jungian and Interdisciplinary Interfaces Between Emotions* both published in 2025 by Routledge offer vibrant selections of contributors from the 2023 international, interdisciplinary conference to the multifaceted aspects of emotions organized by the Research Commission, CGJIZ. Earlier edited research titles include *Jungian dimensions of the mourning process, burial rituals and access to the land of the dead: Intimations of Immortality* published by Routledge, 2023 and *Jungian Perspectives on Indeterminate States: Betwixt and Between Borders* coedited with Pilar Amezaga, 2021. Other research topics include a monograph *Taboo, Personal and Collective Representations; Origin and Positioning within Cultural Complexes*, published by Routledge in 2020. Elizabeth is currently editing the 2025 IAAP Congress Proceedings that offer rich, scholarly research papers from the Congress theme *Experiences of the Non-Understandable: Jungian Explorations and Contributions* published by Daimon, 2026.



Batya Brosh, IJP, Israel

I've found it difficult to capture my professional Bio in just few lines. Since October 7, 2023, our personal and professional lives have changed profoundly, in ways that continue to shape how I see my work and the world around us.

This is my fifth year serving as president of our institute. Given the event of the past two and a half years in Israel, the formation of a right -wing government and the 7th of October attack, which lead to a terrible war, I will focus on two major projects that I am involved.

One of the most significant is "JOINING HANDS", a forum uniting all psychoanalytic institutes in Israel. Freudian, Lacanian, Jungian and more – within a shared ethical and professional framework. Through this collaboration, we have taken a firm stand against the war, against sever harm inflicted on civilians in Gaza, and in support of the release of the hostages. This is a significant forum that enables the presence and recognition of analytical thoughts and understanding in the public sphere. I am also a full partner in the establishment and management of a psychotherapy center in northern Israel. This center was founded during the war with the aim of providing long-term, low-fee analytic treatment to those affected by the war. For nearly fifteen years, I have also been the Liaison Person for UDG. Over the past four years of devastating war in Ukraine – the profound impact of Analytical training has become evident in sustaining containment, stability, and hope among local therapists. Finally, all these initiatives arise from a deep belief in the value of solidarity – the capacity to stand together, to cross geographical and theoretical boundaries and to defend human dignity whenever it is exposed to violence and harm.



Laner Cassar

Laner Cassar is a Jungian Analyst, Imaginative Movement Therapist, and a Clinical psychologist. He currently heads the psychology department at the Gozo General Hospital, Gozo, Malta. He has completed a Ph.D from the Centre of Psychoanalytical Studies in Essex and is the author of book *Jung's Technique of Active Imagination and Desoille's Directed Waking Dream Method: Bridging the divide*, which was shortlisted for the Gradiva award in 2021. He is the president and founder of the Malta Developing Group of the IAAP and director of the Space for Imaginative therapies Education (Malta) where he teaches online, on Imaginative Movement Therapy (IMT): a neo-Jungian approach to active imagination, and the group Dream Weaving approach (DW).

Tom Kelly is past president of the International Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP, 2013 – 2016), past-president of the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts (IRSJA) and past-president of the Council of North American Societies of Jungian Analysts (CNASJA). Concerned about issues related to training in Analytical Psychology, during his term of office with CNASJA, Tom initiated the yearly meeting of the Directors of Training of the North American Societies and chaired these meetings for twenty years. He served as the North American Editor of the *Journal of Analytical Psychology* from 2017 – 2020 and is co-editor, with Gražina Gudaite, of “*Core Competencies in Jungian*

Psychoanalysis: Research, Practice and Training” (2023). Tom has lectured and taught in numerous Developing Groups of the IAAP and was Liaison Person for the Dominican Republic. He was Chair of the Ethics Committee of the IAAP from 2019 – 2025. Tom lives and has a private practice in Montreal, Canada.



Nikolaj Knub, DSAP, Denmark

Nikolaj is a philosopher (MA), systemic nature coach and Jungian psychotherapist in training to become an analyst. Throughout his training Nikolaj has been facilitating study groups and experiential courses exploring in particular Liber Novus and more broadly “Jung’s myth for our time”. Currently his work and interest lies in the intersections between alchemy, active imagination, plant medicines and eco-psychology - a blend which he explores through offering courses, cacao ceremonies, 1:1 therapy and nature coaching.



Ganna Kovalenko, UAAP, Ukraine

My name is Ganna Kovalenko. I am a Ukrainian Jungian analyst, recently joined the UAAP IAAP. I received a psychological education at an age of 35 and started my way as a Jungian, making a turn from a successful academic career: a member of the English philology chair at Kyiv national Taras Shevchenko University, PhD in linguistics (Germanic languages) and a docent. My way as a router started in 2020, when because of Covid-19 all educational processes were reduced to online platforms.

In February 2022 a full-scale Russian invasion to Ukraine drove me with my two children out of Ukraine, as our home city of Kyiv was almost surrounded by the Russians. Despite the calamity, the router educational process continued and became a container linking us Ukrainians to normalcy. Five months later, in August 2022, I returned home and restarted my practice, my patients including war widows, soldiers, Ukrainian refugees abroad and teenagers who either have to adapt to new conditions in Europe or deal with the extreme tension within the country with drone and missile shellings, electricity and heating blackouts. In 2023-2025 I served as a Vice President of the Ukrainian Development Group coordinating the router educational processes, and now I remain the coordinator of the Router program in Ukraine.



Monica Luci, AIPA, Italy

PhD, is a clinical psychologist, Jungian training analyst at AIPA (Rome), and lecturer at the Department of Psychosocial and Psychoanalytic Studies of the University of Essex (UK). For over 25 years she has worked therapeutically with severely traumatised refugees and asylum seekers and consulted international agencies on psychosocial interventions in displacement. She has published widely on the topics of individual and collective trauma, torture, displacement, human rights, gender, and psychoanalysis, including *Torture, Psychoanalysis & Human Rights* (Routledge, 2017), *Torture Survivors in Analytic Therapy: Jung, Politics, Culture* (Routledge, 2022). She serves on the boards of several journals, including the *Journal of Analytical Psychology*, and is currently Honorary Secretary of the IAAP.



Thomas Møgelberg, DSAP, Denmark

Thomas Møgelberg, Denmark. Educated as a Jungian psychoanalyst at the C. G. Jung Institute, Copenhagen. Member of IAAP and DSAP (Dansk Selskab for Analytisk Psykologi). MBPsS, Jungian Training Analyst worked as a psychologist and psychotherapist in psychiatric rehabilitation for over 20 years. From 2016-2019, he was the Honorary Secretary of the IAAP and its Regional Organiser for Central Europe and continues to serve as Liaison for Serbia. He lectures and supervises widely, both home and abroad. He has published numerous papers including 'Psychic Skin: psychotic defences, borderline process and delusions' (JAP Feb 2012, Vol 57, no 1) which won the Fordham prize for best clinical paper in 2012 and was nominated for the Gradiva award in New York in 2013. Latest publications include the Complexity of Trauma (co-editor Luisa Zoppi in 2024) and 'Individuation: The three main decisions in life require taking risks' in Contemporary voices on Individuation (Ed., G.
